## DID YOU KNOW?

February 13th is the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the day when the keys to Swanage Station were handed over to founding members of what is now the Swanage Railway. More next month.

There may be few trains running, but much of what we do at this time of year is preparation towards the start of 7-day-a-week running, which in 2016 starts on Good Friday, 25<sup>th</sup> March, February half-term excepted.

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When there are no trains, there is the Track Team!

Apart from work on the Norden-Worgret section, there is plenty to keep them amused on the Swanage-Norden running line.

They've lifted a couple of track panels by the Engine Shed and remade the bed to improve the drainage, but the job we've all been waiting for is sorting out the track where there is a speed restriction through Herston.



Not only is the track being stabilised, but a new set of crossing timbers is being installed. All being well, normal line speed should be restored soon.

While all this is going on, S&T volunteers Paul Norris and Roy Harrison were busy installing a solar-powered LED lighting device in the loop exit signal. Just something they knocked up at home, like the signal arm that S&T manager Tony North made in his shed, or on his coffee table! The only heritage part is the cabinet, and that's nearly empty – that's modern technology for you!



And to complete the picture at Herston on 3<sup>rd</sup> January, we were moving stuff about on Herston Bank with crane FBC1.

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## Project Wareham

At the Norden level crossing and road/rail interchange site, work continues testing the crossing and associated signalling, and as this newsletter is published, work to install the removable barrier has started. The barrier will have to be removable to allow movements such as this, where the lorry transporting the T9 to its next engagement reverses out onto the Wytch Farm Road on Jan 29<sup>th</sup>.

Further testing is in progress towards our goal of a functioning, certified system by the end of March. Watch this space!
